During 2022, Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM, AHCT member, made remarkable efforts in the humanitarian, relief and development action, where it implemented more than 46 projects in its seven sectors: Livelihoods, Education, Health, WASH, Protection, Shelter and Food Security.

About **417,795** people benefited from those projects, 41% males and 59% females.

Indeed, humanitarian action contributes to the revival of society; and most importantly, it contributes to strengthening its internal social structure and enhancing the cohesion of its people and their belonging to it, which makes it strong enough to face the challenges and difficulties of the present, as well as enables it to take confident steps towards the future.

Additionally, humanitarian action is not restricted to a specific gender, sex, sect or group; rather, it is available to everyone, away from the reasons for discrimination and racism.

Humanitarian action contributes significantly to response in times of disasters and wars to meet the needs of those affected, protect civilians, and support the poor and needy. It also contributes to rebuilding infrastructure and activating basic and sustainable services to help society improve, and it alleviates the suffering of the population, taking into account all educational, economic, health water and food aspects.

According to an OCHA report issued in December 2022, in 2023, there will be about 21.6 million people in need of humanitarian assistance and protection services, which rep-

resents a slight decrease in the number of people in need compared to the number of 2022 which was 23.4 million people.

The main drivers behind these numbers are food insecurity, malnutrition, health, WASH and protection needs.

The importance of humanitarian action also arises as it promotes sustainable development, where it starts from repairing a road, delivering services to a village or place, and providing better educational opportunities for those who live in poorer environments. It, too, provides young men and women with the skills needed to access the labor market, become self-reliant, and start their own income-generating projects.

Moreover, the Foundation had new partnerships and advanced steps to promote and strengthen these partnerships, which contributes to increasing the number of beneficiaries from the Foundation's programs, projects and activities.

In conclusion, we are still determined to enhance serving human in terms of relief and development, assuring our partners, donors and beneficiaries that we will always remain MAAKUM, one hand builds.. and the other reliefs

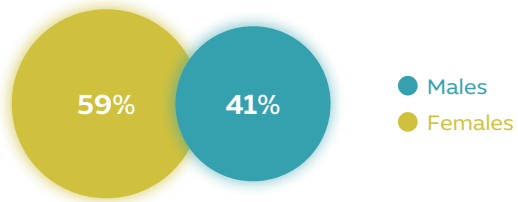
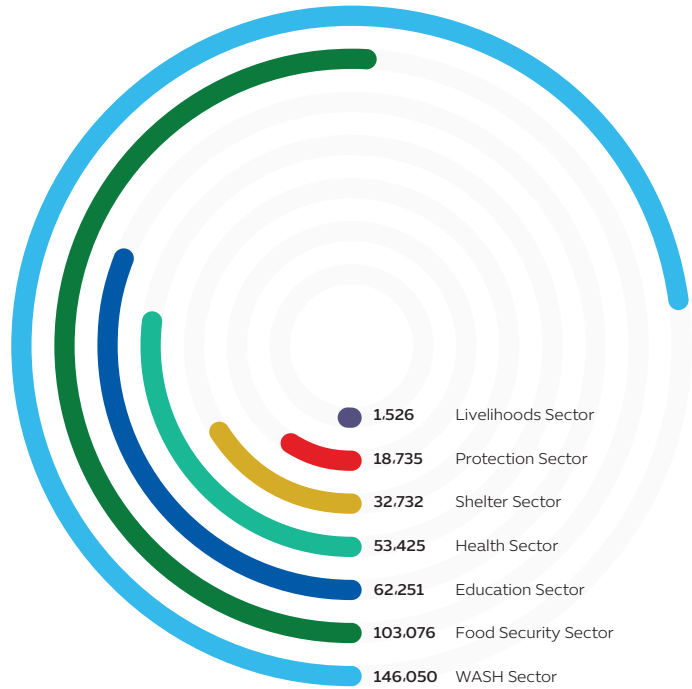

Livelihoods Sector has contributed to enhancing livelihood opportunities and creating sustainable sources of income for aspiring women and youth from vulnerable families to access the labor market and start their own income-generating projects, through training and empowering them in a way that enhances their withstanding, recovery and self-reliance so as to meet their basic needs and lead decent lives.

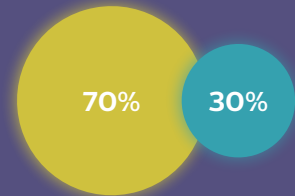

## 1. Empowering Youth and Women Heading their Families

This program contributed to the empowerment of youth and women who support their families through qualifying and providing them with the skills needed for the labor market. 100 young men and women, (51) young men and (49) women, were empowered in four fields: sewing and embroidery, the International Computer Driving License ICDL, graphics and montage, and interior decoration, through providing them with equipment that enhances their livelihood opportunities, prepares them for the labor market and enhances their self-reliance and start their own income-generating projects.





## 2. Enhancing Youth Livelihood Opportunities .

This year, the MAAKUM Foundation contributed to creating work opportunities for aspiring young people, who have no available work opportunities, by training and qualifying (16) trainees in the field of electrical wiring and solar power systems, where they were provided with professional, life and entrepreneurial skills needed for the labor market.

## 3. Supporting Small Projects (Microfinance Program).

This program aims to support affected individuals and families and those who have lost their sources of income with cash so as to restore their livelihood sources through financing their income-generating projects.



## Success Story

Hanan has always craved to learn computer; thus, she was among the hundreds of women to enroll in the economic empowering program for women “Teach Me a Profession 5” in the field of ICDL. “I had applied several times for this program but I had not been accepted, yet I always waited for another opportunity,” Hanan said.

After the differentiation, Hanan was accepted into the program and she completed the admission procedures with vigour, determination and enthusiasm.

“I’ve waited a long time for this opportunity, and I have received the news of my acceptance with great joy,” said she.

Hanan graduated from the program after three months of training in computer with her classmates, and in the ceremony of empowering 100 trainees in four fields, Hanan was delightfully cheerful as she received a laptop, in the presence of a number of guests from the official authorities.

### **What is after training and empowerment?**

Hanan said, “Now I am currently working as a sales manager at MD Perfumes. After the training and empowerment I received from MAAKUM Foundation in the program “Teach Me a Profession5”, I was accepted into this work, where I can now support myself and my family, and I’m looking forward to greater success.”

## Education Sector

Through this sector, MAAKUM Foundation aims to increase access to safe and comprehensive learning opportunities for the most vulnerable school-age children, caregivers and education workers and promote recovery and withstanding, especially of those most in need of educational services in the areas of greatest need, lack of learning facilities and shortage of teaching staffs.

Education Sector at MAAKUM has contributed to achieving that through many projects and activities, including building and furnishing schools, providing children with school bags (which included educational tools) and school uniforms, free full scholarships, and incentives for voluntary teachers for performance so as to reach quality education in schools and achieve the fourth goal of sustainable development.

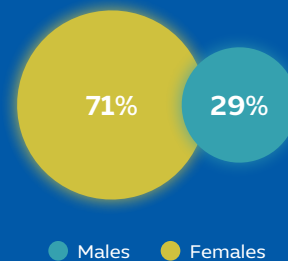

## 1. Distributing cash incentives to voluntary teachers for performance

The education sector is one of the sectors most affected by the war, as the displacement of many teachers who had to leave their jobs encouraged many university graduates to work as voluntary teachers in schools, leading to a great rise in the percentage of voluntary educational staffs, who receive no compensation for their performance.

Thus, MAAKUM contributes to the distribution of cash incentives to voluntary teachers, food baskets and many other programs meant to encourage such teachers so as to fill the existing educational gap.



## Success Story

Ayman dreamed of a free scholarship that would enable him to join the university. In October 2017 Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM announced the scholarship of a bachelor in international business management in English. Ayman took the differentiation exam on November 11, 2017 with (80) other applicants competing for (30) scholarships.

Ayman successfully passed the differentiation test and the personal interview.

Ayman said, «I saw the announcement submitted by Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM on its official Facebook page, and I applied with ambition and great hope that I would be accepted, because the specialization is new and has great acceptance in the labor market. The number of applicants was very large, and the competition was intense. However, thank God, I was accepted into the scholarship, and then a new stage of my life began, a stage filled with optimism to become the person or student I have always dreamed of, as this specialization expresses my future personality that I dream of.

Ayman studied and worked hard for four years. Then he graduated from the university with a «very good» grade.

Ayman Qasem is currently working in the customer service at Alkuraimi Bank – Taiz Branch. He is in charge of foreign remittances and other tasks related to his job.

Ayman said, «In fact, I feel satisfied and happy with who I am now, whether in my job or in terms of the educational level I have achieved. I am also thankful and grateful for Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM for providing such scholarships, opportunities and programs that mainly develop human beings, who are the pillar of development in any work.

This story is a sample of many success stories of which Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM is proud.

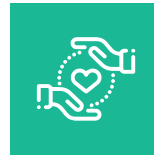


## Health Sector

This sector aims to promote, sustain and expand the minimum package of safe, equitable, comprehensive, life-saving and high-quality humanitarian health services which protect lives of the most vulnerable sections of community.

During 2022, Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM contributed to reducing the deterioration of health conditions in light of the ongoing conflict and reducing the levels of malnutrition among children. It also contributed to reducing the spread of communicable diseases and protecting mothers and children's health in particular in light of the worsening living conditions through a package of projects, including: the free pharmacy project, access to the most affected areas through the mobile medical clinic project, maintaining the effectiveness of the health system through the project of enhancing the capacity of the incubators department, the health kit distribution project, furnishing Dar Al-Hayat for housing cancer patients, Dar Omana for housing renal failure patients, distributing cash incentives to volunteers in health centers and hospitals, and establishing treatment camps.

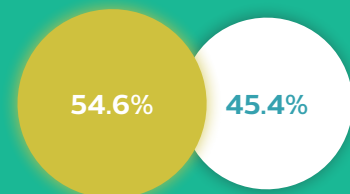

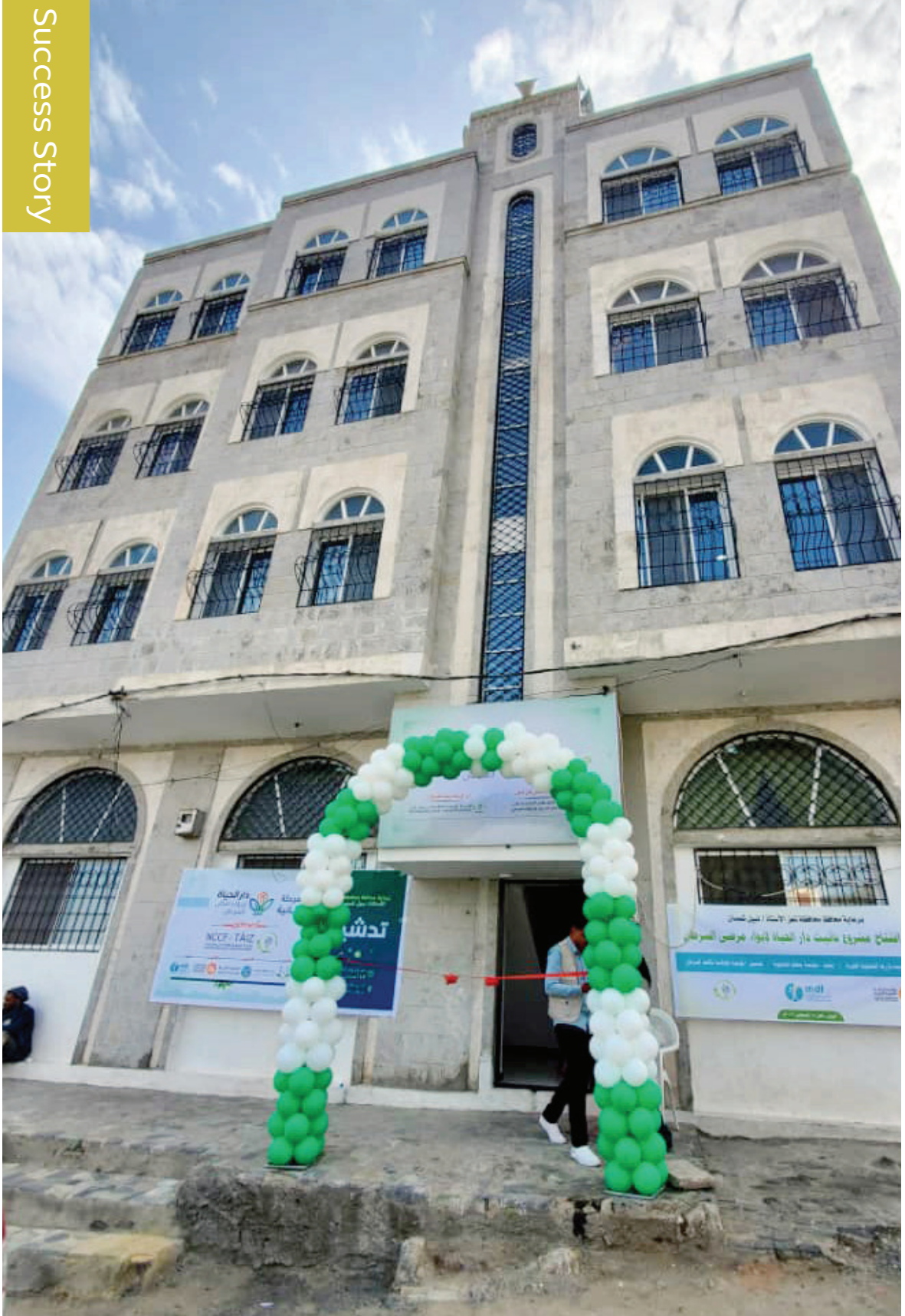

# Dar Al Hayat

## for Cancer Patients

Similar to Dar Umana for housing renal failure patients, which belongs to Ma'akum Development Foundation MAAKUM, the idea of Dar Al-Hayat is to house cancer patients in Taiz Governorate. It is supervised and operated by the National Cancer Control Foundation, in partnership with the Al-Awqaf Office in Taiz, Hail Saeed Anam Charity Foundation, Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM and Bazara Foundation for Developmental. This project aims to find suitable housing for (38) cancer patients, especially children and women, coming from rural and remote areas but do not find shelters and suffer a lot while moving from and to their villages seeking for treatment sessions, in addition to the harsh living and economic conditions of this section of community, which is considered one of the most vulnerable sections of community.

Due to the harsh economic and living conditions of cancer patients, especially those coming from the countryside and different districts of Taiz Gov., estimated at 23, not to mention those coming from other governorates, most of whom are elderly (57%) based on the analysis of the patients' data records in the Hope Center for Cancer. Such patients usually need external housing, especially when taking chemical doses and during the various stages of treatment. Therefore, the foundation is looking for additional housing given the privacy of the psychological state such patients go through, as well as the importance of the medicines they have to take. In addition, cancer patients coming from the countryside to Taiz Gov. need private housing, and the expenses of such housing beside their nutrition are usually high, especially when they have to stay in the city for a long period, which may exceed a month, in order to take their doses, let alone the severity of pain they suffer from and their inability to afford such expenses, along with a general miserable situation for healthy people, let alone sick ones.

According to the latest statistics recorded

at the Hope Center for Cancer in Taiz, the number of patients undergoing therapeutic and chemical doses is (9622), 57% of whom are elderly, 56% are females, 44% are males, 70% are from outside Taiz City, and 30% are from the city's population.

Thus, Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM has initiated the implementation of this project, Furnishing Dar Al-Hayat for Cancer Patients, which can accommodate 38 cancer patients (women - children), with generous funding from Bazara Foundation for Development in coordination with the National Cancer Control Foundation.

Dar Al-Hayat has been provided with (38) beds, (38) comodini, curtains and all the preparation and equipment needed for the patients, in addition to furnishing the management office and reception.

**In August 2022, coinciding with the World Humanitarian Day, after Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM had completed equipping and furnishing it, Dar Al-Hayat was officially opened so that it would be a shelter for cancer patients who were stranded and overwhelmed by the disease.**



## WASH Sector

This sector has contributed to restoring sustainable basic services and improving the quality of water sources for society through digging, rehabilitating and maintaining wells and constructing water tanks, in addition to the urgent response to the humanitarian needs in the field of WASH through continuing to provide the affected population with clean drinking and using water via water tankers.

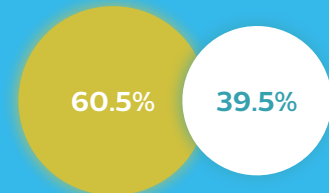

## Protection Sector

Yemen remains having a major protection and displacement crisis, and the protection of civilians remains a critical priority as the conflict continues, with about 4.3 million displaced men, women, boys and girls over the past seven years, 250,000 of whom are just in 2021, especially in Marib, Al-Hodeida, Hajja and Taiz. Yemen has recorded the fourth largest internal displacement crisis in the world.

During 2022, Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM paid the protection sector a great attention, where it involved it within the programs of the other sectors, especially enhancing co-existence and peace building programs. The foundation focused on the most vulnerable groups by providing protection services for women, girls, boys and children and responding to them through a package of projects, programs and activities, including psychosocial support programs for women who have lost their breadwinners because of the war, distributing cash aids for protection to children, distributing cash assistance to vulnerable families to meet their protection needs, and the comprehensive care program which provides care and protection for children who have lost their breadwinners or women exposed to violence or exploitation.

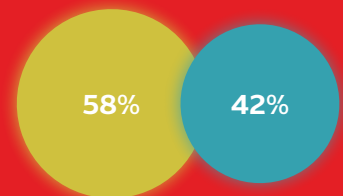

## Comprehensive Care Program for Children Who Have Lost Their Breadwinners



The comprehensive care program for children who have lost their breadwinners is one of the programs implemented by MAAKUM Foundation, and it aims to provide comprehensive care for children (orphans) and families who have lost their breadwinners in order to secure decent lives for them in terms of education, health and development.

MAAKUM supports such segments of society through scholarships for children, social and psychological support for them and their families, and providing them with subsistence and monthly cash aids in order to secure decent lives and a promising future for children and their families.



## Program Outputs

- 1 Full scholarships, including transportation for children in private schools.
- 2 Providing children with school bags, including educational tools.
- 3 Distributing school uniforms, based on age and school.
- 4 Distributing monthly cash assistance.
- 5 visiting children in schools and following up of the level of their educational achievement.
- 6 Implementing a recreational trip & an open day.
- 7 Providing psychosocial support programs for mothers.
- 8 Ramadan Forum for families benefiting from the program.
- 9 Providing children with Eid clothing.
- 10 Providing families benefiting from the program with health kits.

## Program Impact

The program had a positive impact on securing decent lives for children and their families who have lost their breadwinners, as well as encouraging children to continue their education and improving their educational achievement, protecting them from exploitation and violence, and providing them with a safe environment which achieves the psychological stability, social involvement and decent living for them.



## The Program Key Activities



### Scholarships for Children

In war times, children, especially those who have lost their breadwinners (orphans), face a great deal of suffering and they get the most exposed segment of society to extortion and exploitation, in addition to dropping out of school and having to work to provide their own subsistence.

Thus, in order to alleviate that, MAAKUM Foundation sought, through the scholarships program for children, to encourage children to study and secure the requirements for that through providing full scholarships in excellent private schools, along with the continuous follow-up on their social care, in order to secure excellent educational outputs, social involvement and psychological stability for such vulnerable segment of society.



## Psychological Support Program

There is no doubt that families who have lost their breadwinners are of the most vulnerable families subject to psychological disorders and crises, as well as they are subject to gender-based violence. Therefore, there is a great need for such a group to be protected from the risks of violence and exploitation through programs and courses in psychosocial support targeting mostly mothers, then orphans. According to the experiences in the comprehensive care project in particular and the other programs implemented by Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM, such programs create great psychological stability among mothers and extract them from negative thinking, sadness and continuous crying to bring them out to horizons of hope, optimism and positivity in dealing with their children, themselves and society and make them more aware and able to face risks and facilitate their integration into society as a positive element. In addition, they help them try to rely on themselves by learning some vocational and professional skills and professions and access the labor market. Moreover, such programs teach mothers how to raise their children in an atmosphere of psychological and family comfort and a decent life, which encourages them away from any negative feelings of inferiority, persecution or repression.

The program also includes many activities aimed at children and mothers at the same time, such as safe and friendly spaces and recreational trips.



## Shelter Sector

More than one million IDPs live in harsh and unbearable humanitarian conditions where they can rightly be considered the tragedy of the time, as they live in inhumane areas where they lack the most basic necessities of life.

Through Shelter Sector, Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM has contributed to alleviating the suffering of the IDPs by providing life-saving assistance in the field of shelter and non-food items in order to ensure their protection against environmental and other risks, including facing the winter and extreme cold.

The Foundation's contribution to protecting and supporting them and alleviating their suffering takes place through a package of projects, including enhancing the response to a more environmentally-friendly shelter through distributing lighting systems to the IDPs in the most affected camps, distributing winter clothing, emergency cash assistance to the most needy IDPs to meet their protection needs, and the medical convoy for the IDP camps in Taiz, Marib and Al-Hodeida Governorates.

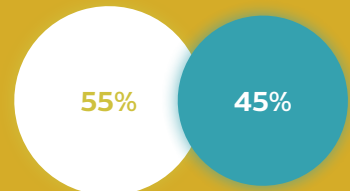

# Winter Bag

The project included distributing integrated winter bags to IDPs and poor families, aiming at alleviating their suffering, protecting them and easing their harsh economic and living conditions by providing them with blankets and winter clothes which can protect them from the cold, especially children and women, in a way that enhances the values of humanity and consolidates solidarity and compassion. The project was funded by the International Islamic Charity Organization - Kuwait



## Brief on the shelter situation in the country

7 years of continuous conflict in Yemen have weakened the population at various levels, as about 23.4 million people (73% of the population) depend on humanitarian assistance to meet their basic needs, and the continuation of the conflict has led to the internal displacement of 4.3 million people until March 2022, about 40% of whom live in informal displacement sites and do not have adequate access to basic services, which are often non-existent. Thus, Yemen has been witnessing the worst humanitarian crisis in the world for years. The conflict has also had a devastating impact on the country's economic situation, causing a full-

blown economic collapse which has reduced GDP per capita by about 50%, and two out of three Yemeni people (20 million men, women and children) live in extreme poverty.

The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) estimated that the humanitarian situation in Yemen would worsen between June and December 2022, where the number of people unable to meet their minimum food needs in Yemen is likely to break a record, 19 million. An additional 1.6 million people in the country are expected to descend into emergency levels of hunger, bringing the total to 7.3 million by the end of 2022.

## Project Summary

After seven years of war and conflict, the situation in Yemen is still tragic; it is exacerbating day after another, and the number of affected and displaced people who lack the minimum necessities of life is increasing. Taiz, in particular, is the most affected governorate by the war and siege, where it is one of the governorates that have witnessed the greatest internal displacement in the country. The suffering of those IDPs and their humanitarian conditions worsens in winter, in addition to the increase in their need for food and medicines as a result of the spread of diseases caused by the cold. Given the urgent humanitarian need for this project, Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM seeks to implement this project every year.

The Winter Bag project aimed to alleviate the suffering of affected and displaced families in winter, protect them from severe cold waves by providing blankets and winter clothes to these families in the Al-Qahera district in Taiz Governorate, where 12-7 targeted families, as these families are considered one of the most affected families due to their proximity to the front lines of the confrontations and the lack of aid and aid to reach them, and they live in unfinished or partially destroyed buildings, After studying the situation of each family through field verification by the project team in coordination with the official authorities and with the facilitation of community committees in the region, and the winter bag contains blankets and winter clothes that take into account age groups and gender (males and females),



## Food Security Sector

Through this sector, Ma'akum Developmental Foundation MAAKUM aims to provide urgent, life-saving food assistance, in a way that meets needy people's needs for basic food, in addition to seasonal cash remittances aiming at protecting families and promoting their resilience, as well as securing better lives for the most affected segments of society.

Additionally, Yemen is witnessing a horrible humanitarian catastrophe, according to UN reports, putting millions of people at risk of hunger unless there are urgent, effective interactions.

MAAKUM is among the most important NGOs that responded to the needy people's appealing calls, as it has met their urgent needs in a way that reserves their dignity and right to life. Moreover, the food security projects have ranged from urgent, life-saving food parcels, dates, hot meals, loaves of bread, and Adahi meat.

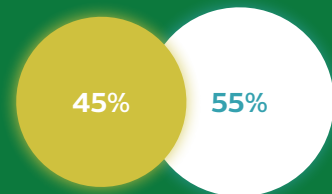
